be stripped, that the suit of garments would fit him like a glove. That suit was of such plan as to fit nobody however the correct man well" (The Sirens of Titan 214). This occasion in the book had been set up to occur as it was anticipated. The Church realized that the Space Traveler would come bare and had the suit uncommonly made for him. It was not by any stretch of the imagination a marvel. This statement indicates how religion can be established on falsehoods. Numerous individuals have faith in religion despite the fact that it may not be valid. Vonnegut is stating that we should think autonomously and make sense of our own thoughts. Reed says of The Sirens of Titan:

It states that while an impassive universe may affirm no reason in our reality, we can offer significance to life by the manner in which we lead it. This involves surrendering the scan for a method of reasoning in the immense operations of the universe, the chase for some answer from above, and swinging to ourselves to give meaning... (496)

Reed additionally says that Vonnegut is stating we are the ones that need to look for reason ourselves. We have to think autonomously. We can't generally swing to religion to give us the appropriate responses since religions are not really honest.

Vonnegut discusses hallucinations that society has faith in. There is regularly no proof to credit these convictions, thoughts, or occasions, yet individuals still recognize them. Vonnegut states: "The appearances had been occurring for a long time, when each fifty-nine days. The most learned and reliable men on the planet had asked sorrowfully for the benefit of seeing an emergence. Regardless of how the men worded their solicitations, they were turned down virus. The refusal was dependably the equivalent, written by hand by Mrs. Rumfoord's social secretary". (The Sirens of Titan 116)

The emergences are something that everybody has faith in however they have never really observed one. A few people attempt to scrutinize their validity, yet they discover no answers. Vonnegut is demonstrating that when we endeavor to address mainstream views, we may not generally discover the appropriate responses. He needs us to continue endeavoring to discover the appropriate responses. Olderman says of Vonnegut, "... he discovers we have depleted our qualities and can continue living just through the acknowledgment of figments" (505). This is stating that numerous individuals live on hallucinations, similar to the appearance. Vonnegut needs individuals to address figments, similar to religion, and have an independent mind. He supposes it is insane that such a significant number of individuals live by things that may not be valid. This is the reason he needs us to think freely and discover the appropriate responses ourselves.

In The Sirens of Titan, Vonnegut additionally discusses science. Science is something exceedingly esteemed by him. He states, "Quit talking the dialect of science to one another! (The Sirens of Titan 127). This statement indicates how religions don't need individuals to find out about science. Science can ruin everything religion says are certainties. Vonnegut ponders science, so they can make sense of what convictions and thoughts are valid or not. Reed says that "Vonnegut places impressive accentuation on the way that we know almost no about a lot" (498). This implies individuals don't generally realize that much about what is genuine. They don't have a clue about that much about science, which is a characterizing component of what is extremely a reality. Individuals couldn't care less to adapt enough about science to figure out what is genuine and what isn't.
