The book describes applications of forensic entomology used in criminal cases during that period. A man was murdered by the roadside apparently by an assailant with a sickle. Sung Tz'u made a proclamation that the nearest neighbours were to bring all their sickles to him for examination (McKnight 1981).

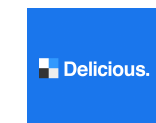
